toward the end of the 20th century there is both a dissatisfaction with existing formal semantic theories and a wish to preserve insights from other semantic traditions cognitive semantics the latest of the major trends which have dominated the century attempts to do this by focusing on meaning as a cognitive phenomenon this book provides different perspectives on meaning as a cognitive phenomenon jens allwood presents an approach where meaning is analyzed in terms of context sensitive cognitive operations peter gärdenfors examines the

relationship between cognitive semantics and standard formal extensional and intensional semantics peter harder discusses the relation between functionalism and cognitive semantics sören sjöström and ke viberg extend a cognitive semantic approach to new empirical domains like vision and physical contact elisabeth engberg pedersen extends the use of cognitive semantics even further in order to analyze deaf sign language and finally kenneth holmqvist and jordan zlatev discuss two different possibilities of implementing a cognitive semantic approach using computer programs the variety of perspectives on cognitive semantics make this book suitable as course material

this collected volume presents radically new directions which are emerging in cognitive lexical semantics research a number of papers re ignite the polysemy vs monosemy debate and testify to the fact that polysemy is no longer simply taken for granted but is currently a much more contested issue than it was in the 1980s and 1990s other papers offer fresh perspectives on the prototype structure of lexical categories while generally accepted notions about the radial network structure of categories are questioned in papers on the development of word meaning in child language acquisition and in diachrony additional topics include the interaction of lexical and constructional meaning and the relationship between word meanings and the contexts in which the words are encountered this book is of interest to semanticists and cognitive linguists as well as to scholars working in the broader field of cognitive science

nearly three decades since the publication of the seminal metaphors we live by cognitive linguistics is now a mature theoretical and empirical enterprise with a voluminous associated literature it is arguably the most rapidly expanding school in modern linguistics and one of the most exciting areas of research within the interdisciplinary project known as cognitive science as such cognitive linguistics is increasingly attracting a broad readership both within linguistics as well as from neighbouring disciplines including other cognitive and social sciences and from disciplines within the humanities this volume contains over 20 papers by leading experts in cognitive linguistics which survey the state of the art and new directions in cognitive linguistics the volume is divided into 5 sections covering all the traditional areas of study in cognitive linguistics as well as newer areas including applications and extensions sections include approaches to semantics approaches to metaphor and blending approaches to grammar language embodiment and cognition extensions and applications of cognitive linguistics

in his ten beijing lectures leonard talmy represents the range of his work in cognitive semantics the central concern of this approach is the linguistic representation of conceptual structure that is the patterns in which and processes by which conceptual content is organized in language the lectures examine the semantics of grammar force dynamics a typology of how motion events are represented factive versus fictive motion a typology of event integration differences in how spoken and signed language structure space the attention system of language introspection as a methodology in linguistics the relation of language to other cognitive systems and digitalization in the evolution of language

in line with the increasing use of empirical methods in cognitive linguistics the current volume explores the uses of quantitative in particular corpus driven techniques for the study of meaning it shows how these techniques contribute to the core theoretical issues of cognitive semantics as well as how they inform semantic analysis the research presented in the volume constitutes an important step towards an empirical cognitive semantics

this volume presents new developments in cognitive grammar and explores its descriptive and explanatory potential with respect to a wide range of language phenomena these include the formation and use of locationals causative constructions adjectival and nominal expressions of oriented space morphological layering tense and aspect and extended uses of verbal predicates there is also a section on the affinities between cognitive grammar and early linguistic theories both ancient and modern

the aim of this book is to present significant aspects of cognitive grammar by adopting an interdisciplinary approach the book provides an interplay of contributions by some exponents of cognitive grammar langacker croft wood geeraerts kövecses wildgen and philosophers of language albertazzi marconi peruzzi violi who in most cases share a phenomenological and gestalt approach to the problem of semantics the topics covered include themes that are central to the debate in cognitive grammar such as metaphor construal operations prototypicality gestalt schemes and field semantics the book offers evidence to support the cognitive hypothesis in semantics and the existence of a close connection between the structures of perception and the categories of natural language because of the approach employed with its consideration of borderline aspects among semantics linguistics theoretical reflection and historical analysis the book marks out a route for a philosophical inquiry complementary to a cognitive approach to the semantics of natural language

the book presents two fundamental theories that characterize the cultural historical perspective in cognitive semantics the four level theory of cognitive development fltcd and the sociocultural theory of lexical complexes stlc as well as their application to the analysis of specific material in particular the book analyzes the sociocultural history of the machine metaphor specifically its use in the texts of rené descartes and francis bacon the practical embodiment of stlc is demonstrated through the analysis of lexical complexes such as otkryvat to open kamen stone and intelligencija intelligentsia in the final chapter of the monograph fltcd and stlc are used for the diachronic analysis of semantic change the monograph will be of interest to a wide range of linguists psychologists cultural anthropologists and philosophers who consider language as a sociocultural phenomenon

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semantics a cognitive account of linguistic meaning is a comprehensive introduction to the study of the meaning of linguistic expressions in english words and sentences in conducting the analysis it draws on two sources first it relies on the assumptions of cognitive linguistics which describes language as being non modular symbolic usage based meaningful and creative second it hinges on the assumptions of cognitive semantics which describes meaning as being embodied motivated dynamic encyclopaedic and conceptualised it explicates these assumptions clearly and applies them to diverse areas of language ultimately it enables students to recognise the complexity of the english linguistic system and trains them to solve the intricate puzzles characterising its nature

the future of english linguistics as envisaged by the editors of topics in english linguistics lies in empirical studies which integrate work in english linguistics into general and theoretical linguistics on the one hand and comparative linguistics on the other the tiel series features volumes that present interesting new data and analyses and above all fresh approaches that contribute to the overall aim of the series which is to further outstanding research in english linguistics

the volume explores the ways in which language change is studied within the framework of cognitive linguistics a semantics based theory of language production and perception the eleven chapters explore two kinds of changes firstly those which involve mental prototypes or best instances of particular concepts and extensions of these prototypes and secondly those which relate to conceptual networks for example via metaphor or metonymy more specifically the papers address syntactic and lexical change as well as the evolution of language and changes in the expression usually metaphoric of emotions in presenting a wide range of current work of this kind the volume demonstrates the value of cross fertilization between historical and cognitive linguistics and is intended to open the way for further related research the included papers are of particular relevance to those working in metaphor theory and syntactic semantic change within cognitive linguistics but will also be of interest to other historical linguists and those studying cognitive semantics and metaphor from a synchronic viewpoint

biographical note beate hampe is assistant professor at the english department of the friedrich schiller universität jena germany joseph e grady has left university and works for a company called cultural logic which specializes in applied cognitive linguistics anthropology in washington dc usa

this volume brings together seventeen previously published papers on lexical and semantic topics by one of the most influential authors in cognitive linguistic lexicology spanning the period from the late 1980s to recent years the collection features a number of papers that may be

considered classics within the field of cognitive linguistic lexicology the thematic sections of the collection successively deal with prototypicality as a theoretical and practical model of semantic description polysemy and criteria for distinguishing between meanings the semantics of idioms and constructions cultural aspects of meaning lexicography and the history and methodology of lexical semantics this broad spectrum of topics makes the book an excellent introduction to the field of lexicological and lexical semantic research at large

cognitive models perspectives and the construction of situated meaning have always been core concepts in cognitive linguistics the papers in this volume present applications of those concepts to the study of discourse phenomena like the use and interpretation of metaphors modal expressions focus particles tag questions indirect speech acts and iconographic textual references the volume also includes two studies focussing on cognitive processes involved in discourse production

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
